Matthew studied Drama at Bristol University and has worked as an actor for 40 years, alongside producing and directing many new plays. In recent years he has also become a writer. Theatre acting includes work at the Citizens Theatre Glasgow, Manchester Royal Exchange, Bristol Old Vic, Liverpool Everyman, Royal Lyceum Edinburgh, the Lyric Hammersmith, Bush Theatre and the Young Vic. Screen acting in recent years includes feature films The Crucifixion (Xavier Gens), Valhalla Rising (Nicholas Winding Refn), And Violet (Paul Gray), A Lonely Place To Die (Julian Gilbey) and TV appearances in Shetland, One Of Us, Happy Valley & Still Game. He wrote and performed The Tailor of Inverness for the company, winning the 2009 Best Actor Award at the Critics' Awards for Theatre in Scotland and several other awards. The Tailor of Inverness has played in 13 countries. His book, The Tailor of Inverness was published in 2013 by Sandstone Press.



Donna Macrae was born in Inverness. She left school to attend the Edinburgh College of Art. Over the last 40 years, Donna has been involved in Production and Productioner Management in the Arts world with her business Firefly Productions delivering hugely successful productions and events across a wide range of disciplines from Television Production, Music Agency and Music Business Consultancy through to delivering the Highland-wide Blas Festival for 12 years from its inception through to November 2016. Jonny co-founded Old Blind Dogs in 1929, or thereabouts. Since the band began, they have recorded 15 studio albums and two live albums.

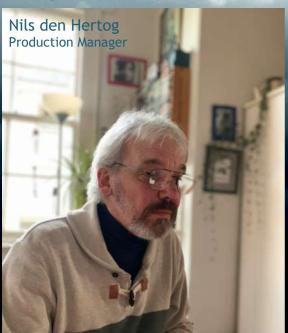

He has worked in a broad range of genres, including comedy, drama and animation and was awarded a BAFTA for directing the CBBC fantasy adventure show, Raven.



I have worked in Scottish Theatre since 1978 after graduating from the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama (now the Royal Conservatoire) from 1983 I worked for STV for 11 years followed by 5 years as freelance in film and TV.

In 1998 I returned to theatre as Stage Manager at the Traverse Theatre and then went to Dundee Rep Theatre in 1999 as Company Stage Manager for the newly formed Dundee Rep Ensemble Company, followed by roles as Technical Manager and Production Manager for the same company.

From 2017 I have been freelance working for various companies such as Lung Ha, Ten Foot Tall, Dirlie Bane and Perth Theatre.

Thank you for watching our new production by the remarkable new playwright, Jack MacGregor. Nightlands is an original and perceptive drama which takes its audience into an extraordinary place and into the psychological world of two characters who are desperately trying to make sense of a world in which they no longer fit. The play expresses much of the anguish and disorientation which accompanied the collapse of the Soviet Union and its aftermath during the 1990s, a period of a kind of capitalist anarchy in Russia which laid the foundations for the Russia we see today. This is undoubtedly a play for our times.

Nightlands is one of the two plays which form Dogstar's project Arctic Winds Part 1. This filmed version of Nightlands will be joined soon by George Gunn's The Fallen Angels of the Moine, a miniature Brechtian epic inspired by the proposal to build a spaceport on the Moine peninsula on the north coast of Scotland, encroaching on Europe's biggest blanket bog. Both of these plays are also provocative meditations on humanity's relationship with the planet. The project also includes an excellent Creative Learning Programme which is being produced with our Swedish partners, Profilteatern (profilteatern.se). Our Creative Learning Resources Pack is now available on our website for anyone to download.

Arctic Winds Part 2 will see both plays toured in repertoire to audiences throughout Scotland later in 2022, or in 2023. This will be a new touring model for Dogstar: touring more than one play and residing in venues for longer, offering additional creative and participatory activities for audiences; the plays use the same set elements, in differing configurations, thus enabling a more efficient use of resources; and the production of the plays in both filmed and live theatre formats will enable wider access to these stories.

Jack MacGregor on Nightlands

Nightlands is a story about memory, how we can look at the same past and become very different people. In 1991 the Soviet Union collapsed into fifteen independent countries, we are still living with the often violent political and economic consequences of this event. These complex and often contradictory feelings are characterised by the Belarussian author Svetlana Alexeivich as "the Russian-Soviet soul" - the twin parts of yearning for the past, and the desire to escape it.

Nowhere is this felt more acutely than the Russian-Ukrainian exclaves perched in the Norwegian archipelago of Svalbard, high in the Arctic. These remote mining settlements have faced cultural and economic shocks in the decades since dissolution, with austerity measures forcing the town of Pyramiden, home to nearly a thousand residents, to close in 1998.

It is here where Nightlands finds its setting; in the ruins of a Soviet model town at the end of history, where two strangers, caretakers of the settlement, try to pick up the pieces of a world they no longer feel a part of. Slava, a young woman from the provinces of Russia's vastness, barely clings to the hope of a democratic spring after a decade of desperate poverty. Sasha, an older man from eastern Ukraine, who spent his youth in the aftermath of the Great Patriotic War, now lives a bitter exile, working in Pyramiden, shunning the outside world. Both must work together to survive the polar night. Their intergenerational and political conflict sheds light on the division that today's autocrats use to gain power. The play expresses the loss of faith in democratic institutions in the face of austerity and a culture of unaccountability.





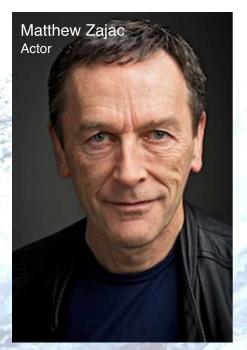

Nightlands represents Jack's professional debut as a writer and director of a full-length play for Scottish stages.

Thank you for watching our new production by the North of Scotland's most experienced playwright, George Gunn. The Fallen Angels of the Moine is an extraordinary miniature epic, a poetic firecracker of a play which, in the great Brechtian tradition, provokes the viewer to make her own connections and considerations of its subject. In this case, we are dealing with humanity's impact on our planet, the struggle between conservation and corporate interests in economic, environmental and cultural terms. This struggle is embodied by each of the play's earthly characters, Cait Mackay, Robbie Oliphant and Cianna Swann, ordinary people faced with the challenges and compromises presented by powerful external forces.

Matthew Zajac Artistic Director



I was born in Caithness, where I live I have been a deep-sea fisherman, a North Sea oil driller, a journalist, poet and playwright. My first play was Roughneck (Traverse, 1984). Since then I have written over 50 plays for stage, community groups, schools and BBC radio. For 19 years, until 2010, I was Artistic Director of Grey Coast Theatre Company which was based in Caithness. We produced new plays by new Highland writers which toured Scotland, as well as large and small scale site-specific productions in the Far North, and lots of work with and for schools throughout the Highlands and Islands. These included Songs of the Grey Coast (1992), published with The Gold of Kildonan (1989, Eden Court), The great Bunillidh Volcano (1994), The Niss (1996), Camster & The Orkneyinga Saga(1998), Egil (1999) & Atomic City (2001).

Atomic City and Egil, were published in 2010 and my collection of poems, A Northerly Land, was published in 2013. I write a monthly column for Bella Caledonia called "From The Province of the Cat," and I also now run the Ravenskald Writers' Workshop.

I live in Thurso with my wife Christine. My play, 3000 Trees, was produced by Grey Coast for the Edinburgh Festival Fringe in 2014. In 2018 I was commissioned by the Royal Lyceum to write Call Me Mister Bullfinch. In 2019 I received an Open Space award for my play The Fallen Angels of the Moine which will be produced by Dogstar Theatre. My collected poems After The Rain was published by Kennedy and Boyd in 2018.

George Gunn on The Fallen Angels of the Moine

The bogs of the north of Scotland - The Moine - have been the source of myths, legends, strange events and sightings throughout history. Kelpies, feachs, fairies and other weird and supernatural beings provide a rich folklore.

This is a story about The Shee who have travelled across the universe and through time and who have chosen to reside beneath The Moine. Environmental calamity now threatens their chosen home.

The play idescribes how The Shee live and how humanity can learn from them. Cianna, an hydrologist, with the help of a local young woman, Cait, of extraordinary preternatural gifts, discovers the reality of what has been going on, about the truth behind a nearby rocket launch site or space hub and what the company who are constructing it, and who Cianna is working for, propose for The Moine. It is Cait who tells Cianna about The Shee. Robbie Oliphant, a local councillor, is caught in the middle of all of this. On one hand he carries a torch for Cait and on the other he has to deal with the builders of the space hub.

Is nature constant? The play contends that everything changes: that there are processes of decay, and processes of substitution and adaption. The story of our otherworld visitors The Shee and their relationship with the central characters in the play will suggest that environment governs change, that real change for humanity is in the way we live. We watch what is going on around us, and we change according to circumstances. We have to change in order to live. But how we live determines how we behave, and how we behave determines how we live. Humanity is complex - a duality comprising reason and the unknown. Like The Shee, we can change profoundly, and like them we can dream a better version of ourselves. This is the positive message of the play. Humanity - like the characters in the play - is compelled to change and to move forward, yet we are unclear about it, ambivalent about it, troubled by it. The Shee are not like that - they are certain of their task: to journey on.
